## Demonstrate your knowledge, skills, and preparation

### Demonstration of OT Traits

#### Maturity & Professionalism

OTs work with clients from a variety of backgrounds. It's important to demonstrate that you can work with all clients with professionalism, and good interpersonal & communication skills. Demonstration of strong work ethic through various activities will show your professionalism as a future healthcare provider.

#### Creativity & Flexible Thinking

One of the OT's roles is to come up with a solution for clients who lost the ability to do things they used to do. It's important to have flexible thinking and come up with creative solutions. Try new activities, and challenge yourself to demonstrate this ability!

### Academic Preparation

*Ensure you're academically prepared for the rigor of OT school.*

- Complete a bachelor's degree and prerequisites
- Competitive applicants have high GPAs, so build and strengthen your time management skills
- Any major is appropriate; make sure to pick the right fit for you, and study what you love!

### Extracurricular Activities

Many OT programs encourage students to engage in **service to their community**, and have **leadership** experiences prior to their application to OT programs. ### Shadowing and Clinical Experience with Occupational Therapists

*This should be one of your first experiences as a preOT student. Observing licensed occupational therapists working in different environments will help you understand the profession, as well as help you get to know OTs. This is important, as many OT programs require at least one letter of recommendation from an OT. Interacting well with sick or injured people is one of the key indicators of a successful healthcare provider.*

Many students find shadowing opportunities through volunteer experiences at medical/private facilities and wellness clinics. **UUOT suggests students shadow a minimum of 50 hours in at least two different settings.**

For UUOT, students taking **OC TH 3000 (Intro to OT)** at the U with a grade of B or higher will be able to **waive 25 of the 50 hours of observation**, and will only be required to have contact with one setting outside of class.

# APPLICATION PROCESS AND INFORMATION

## PPA is here to help!

*Preparing for OT school can be complex and nuanced. But you don't have to do it alone! PPA offers a variety of services to aid you during this time. From application and personal statement reviews to mock interviews, we want to help you with this process. Meet with a PPA advisor at least once a semester to help guide you along the way.*

### **Start Saving NOW!**

Applying to OT school can be expensive. The application fee for OTCAS is approx. \$160, which includes applying to one school; each additional school is \$69. These fees will increase each year. Some programs may have additional supplemental fees. OTCAS offers a limited number of fee waivers for qualified applicants on a first-come, first served basis.

## **APPLICATION DETAILS**

Most OT programs admit students once a year, most commonly for fall matriculation. Plan on taking the GRE and submitting your application at least 12 months in advance of the year for which you are applying.

### **Do your research!**

It is your responsibility to ensure you are meeting all requirements for the schools you are interested in. When selecting OT programs, we recommend that you look at schools that align with your interests: location, size, student/faculty ratio, representation, etc. You can search for OT schools on the American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA) website, [aota.org/education/find-a-school](http://aota.org/education/find-a-school).

### **OTCAS (Occupational Therapy Centralized Application Service)**

Most US OT programs utilize [OTCAS](#).

- Application requirements include transcripts, extracurricular experiences, personal statment, and fees
- Many schools use a rolling admissions process (meaning they begin reviewing applications and admitting before the deadlines). It will benefit you greatly to *submit your application early*, regardless of when you take the GRE. OTCAS and UUOT recommend students submit their application a month before the deadline, *at the latest*.
- The application will take most students several weeks to complete. Ensure you have plenty of time to fill out the application.

### **GRE**

Some programs require the Graduate Record Exam (GRE). **UUOT does not require the GRE.** The GRE is offered throughout the year, and taking the exam by the spring of the year before you wish to enter OT school will enable you to apply earlier. The exam may be repeated, but it's always best to prepare thoroughly and take the GRE once. It has three sections: Verbal Reasoning, Quantitative Reasoning, and Analytical Writing. COST and PREP: The exam costs over \$200. There are a variety of ways to prep for taking the GRE. You can purchase a test prep book, utilize free resources online, or purchase a study course (for example, through the University of Utah Continuing Education).

## POLICIES and CONSIDERATIONS

AP/IB CREDIT	Depends on program. <i>UUOT does not accept AP/IB credit to fulfill prerequisites.</i>
REPEATS	All grades will be counted in your OTCAS calculated GPA. How repeated courses are viewed will vary by the specific OT program. For example, UUOT will take the highest grade achieved <b>only in prerequisite courses</b> . However, many programs will consider your performance in each class and the frequency of repeats.
WITHDRAWALS	Although W's will not affect your GPA, W's should be used sparingly. Work with your advisor.
GPA	Most OT programs require minimum overall and prerequisite GPA of 3.0. Competitive applicants for most programs have 3.3 or higher in both overall and prereq GPA. <i>UUOT requires a minimum of 3.0 for both overall and prerequisite GPAs.</i> However, competitive applicants usually have a 3.5 or higher.
MINIMUM GRADE	Most programs set a minimum grade requirement for prereqs of a C or better.
GRADE EXPIRATION	Many programs require certain prereqs to be completed within 5 to 7 years of entering a OT program. Check each program's requirements for more information. <i>UUOT requires anatomy to be taken within five years.</i>
INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS	Depends on program. UUOT accepts international students. Most schools which accept international students usually require the TOEFL in addition to the GRE.

### Letters of Recommendation

Students are required to submit **Letters of Recommendation** through OTCAS. OTCAS limits applicants to 5 letters, but most programs require just 3. The number and types of LORs vary depending on each OT program, but generally, you will need one letter from each of the following people:

- OT you shadowed
- Professor (usually science)
- Supervisor (usually employment, volunteer, etc)

# PreOT Prerequisite Course Guide

Requirements vary by program. It is your responsibility to do your own research on each OT program you wish to apply to. AP coursework may or not be accepted. If accepted, coursework beyond AP is often required.

Shaded boxes indicate the classes most commonly required by OT programs. **Bolded** classes may be taken at a community college; however, not all programs accept prerequisites from 2 year schools.
