Academic Preparation

Ensure you're academically prepared for the rigor of PT school

- Complete a bachelor's degree and prerequisites (last page)
- Competitive applicants have high GPAs, so build and strengthen your time management skills
- Any major is appropriate; make sure to pick the right fit for you, and study what you love!

Demonstrate your knowledge, skills, and preparation

Leadership and Teamwork

PTs are both leaders and team members with patients, colleagues, etc. PTs are often literally holding up their patients, so having strong leadership skills helps to establish trust

Examples of leadership include coaching, teaching, tutoring, mentoring, TA/LA, supervising, being an club officer, student advisory board, and many more.)

Shadowing and Clinical Experience with Physical Therapists

This should be one of your first experiences as a prePT student. Observing licensed physical therapists working in different environments will help you understand the profession. Interacting well with sick people is one of the key indicators of a successful healthcare provider.

Many students find shadowing opportunities through volunteer experiences at medical/private facilities and wellness clinics. **UUPT suggests students shadow a minimum of 100 hours. 250 hours of observation/clinical experience with 1-2 different PTs is average for accepted applicants to their program.**

In order to gain hands-on experiences with patients, most students get a job as a PT aide. Although not necessary or required, a job as a PT aide provides excellent opportunities for observation and hands-on experience.

APPLICATION PROCESS AND INFORMATION

PPA is here to help!

Preparing for PT school can be complex and nuanced. But you don't have to do it alone! PPA offers a variety of services to aid you during this time. From application and personal statement reviews to mock interviews, we want to help you with this process. Meet with a PPA advisor at least once a semester to help guide you along the way.

Start Saving NOW!

Applying to PT school can be expensive. The application fee for PTCAS is over \$160, which includes applying to one school; each additional school is \$60. These fees will increase each year. Some programs may have additional supplemental fees. PTCAS offers a limited number of fee waivers for qualified applicants on a first-come, first served basis.

APPLICATION DETAILS

Most PT programs admit students once a year, most commonly for summer or fall matriculation, although start dates range from May-January of the following year. Plan on taking the GRE and submitting your application at least 12 months in advance of the year for which you are applying.

Do your research!

It is your responsibility to ensure you are meeting all requirements for the schools you are interested in. When selecting PT programs, we recommend that you look at schools that align with your interests: location, size, student/faculty ratio, representation, etc. You can search for PT schools on the Physical Therapy Centralized Application Service (PTCAS) Programs Directory website, ptcasdirectory.apta.org.

PTCAS (Physical Therapy Centralized Application Service)

Most US PT programs utilize PTCAS, which is available at apta.org/cas/ptcas.

- Application requirements include transcripts, extracurricular experiences, personal statment, and fees
- Many schools use a rolling admissions process (meaning they begin reviewing applications and admitting before the deadlines). It will benefit you greatly to *submit your application early*, regardless of when you take the GRE.
- The application will take most students several weeks to complete. Ensure you have plenty of time to fill out the application.

GRE

Some programs require the Graduate Record Exam (GRE). The GRE is offered throughout the year, and taking the exam by the spring of the year before you wish to enter PA school will enable you to apply earlier. The exam may be repeated, but it's always best to prepare thoroughly and take the GRE once. It has three sections: Verbal Reasoning, Quantitative Reasoning, and Analytical Writing. COST and PREP: The exam costs over \$200. There are a variety of ways to prep for taking the GRE. You can purchase a test prep book, utilize free resources online, or purchase a study course (for example, through the University of Utah Continuing Education).

Additional Exams

Acuity Insights is a platform that contains three non-cognitive assessments adopted by many professional schools. Most PT schools that use Acuity Insights only require the Casper exam and sometimes Snapshot. Casper is a situational judgement test that assesses 10 characteristics, including empathy, equity, professionalism, and more. Snapshot is a short, one-way virtual interview that highlights communication skills and motivation for your chosen profession. These exams may be taken prior to interviewing or on an applicant's interview day. Additional information on Casper can be found on Acuity Insights.

POLICIES and CONSIDERATIONS

AP/IB CREDIT	Depends on program. Check each school's requirements. <i>UUPT does not accept AP/IB for prereqs.</i>
REPEATS	All grades will be counted in your PTCAS calculated GPA. How repeated courses are viewed will vary by the specific PT program. For example, UUPT will take the better grade only in prerequisite courses . However, many programs will consider your performance in each class and the frequency of repeats.
WITHDRAWALS	Although W's will not affect your GPA, W's should be used sparingly. Work with your advisor.
GPA	Most PT programs require minimum overall and prerequisite GPA of 3.0. Competitive applicants for most programs have 3.3 or higher in both overall and prereq GPA. UUPT requires a minimum of 3.0 for both overall and prerequisite GPAs. However, competitive applicants usually have a 3.5 or higher.
MINIMUM GRADE	Most programs set a minimum grade requirement for prereqs of a C or better.
GRADE EXPIRATION	Many programs require certain prereqs to be completed within 5 to 7 years of entering a PT program. Check each program's requirements for more information. <i>UUPT requires anatomy, physiology, chemistry (with labs), physics (with labs), and exercise physiology to be taken within 7 years from the date of application; math and psychology within 10 years.</i>

Letters of Recommendation

Students are required to submit **Letters of Recommendation** through PTCAS. PTCAS limits applicants to 4 letters, but most programs require just 3. (* UUPT requirement) The number and types of LORs vary depending on each PT program, but generally, you will need one letter from each of the following people:

- PT you shadowed*
- Professor (usually science)*
- Any supervisor (usually employment)*
- Other professor (possibly a professor in your major. UUPT may accept a letter from an athletic coach.)

Requirements vary by program. It is your responsibility to do your own research on each PT program you wish to apply to. AP coursework may or not be accepted. If accepted, coursework beyond AP is often required.

Shaded boxes indicate the classes most commonly required by PT programs. **Bolded** classes may be taken at a community college; however, not all programs accept prerequisites from 2 year schools.
